Mitchell Fennell is The Coordinator of

Wind Studies and Director of Bands at Cal State Fullerton. He conducts the University Wind Symphony, the University Band, and teaches undergraduate and graduate instrumental conducting, courses in wind literature and courses in music education. He is also the producer of the Bravo Bands concert series which is one of the few professional concert series in America dedicated to wind music performance.


The University Wind Symphony, under the direction of Dr. Fennell, has produced five compact disc recordings featuring the music of Warren Benson, Alfred Reed, Richard Wagner, Paul Hindemith, Karel Husa, Leslie Bassett, Zdenek Lukas, and Vincent Persichetti. They recently presented the world premiers of William Kraft's Vintage Renaissance and Beyond for the opening of Meng Concert Hall and performed the premier Krafts Concerto for Timpani and Wind Ensemble. The compact disc recording of the Cal State Fullerton Wind Symphony, Monuments and Motifs features the premier performance and recording of Frank Ticheli's Concerto for Clarinet and Wind Band.

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The Wind Symphony has also performed at music conventions and festivals in South Korea, Japan, Germany, Austria and Denmark, and Portugal as well as for California Music Educators conferences and at College Band Directors National Association Western Regional conventions.

In addition to his duties at Cal State Fullerton, Associate Professor Fennell has conducted a live Public Radio broadcast of Myer Kupferman's Images of Chagall and Stravinsky's L'Histoire du Soldat. He has also published a teaching guide to "Winds of Nagual" by Michael Colgrass, which appears in the second volume of Teaching Music Through Performance in Band by Richard Miles. He appeared as a guest conductor with the Army Band and National Guard Band of Portugal and Escola de Musica do Conservatorio Nacional in Lisbon. Dr Fennell has frequently appeared as a guest conductor, adjudicator and clinician in South Korea as well.

Dr. Fennell received his Bachelor of Music degree from Long Beach State University and the Master of Music and Doctorate of Arts degree from the University of Northern Colorado. He holds an Honorary Life Membership in the Southern California Band and Orchestra Association and is a recipient of the Orpheus award from Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia. He is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda, Phi Mu Alpha, Music Educators National Conference, and the College Band Directors National Association.

He has been a section leader and principal player at Saratoga High School. He also serves as a mentor in the MESH (Music Education with Saratoga High) program at Redwood Middle School. Outside of school, Desmond was a member of the Santa Clara Vanguard Cadets Drum Corps in 2010. Desmond is also currently working on college audition material and hopes to study music and possibly another major at the university level.

Danserye, Thielman Susato

The Danserye is a set of instrumental dances based on popular tunes of the time, arranged by Susato and published in 1551 as Het derde musyck boexken. With over 50 individual dances in a variety of forms, the collection is notable for its simple textures and strict homophony. Specific instrumentation is not indicated thus suggesting that the tunes were performed by whatever combination of winds and strings were available

Selections from the Danserye is a new setting for wind band consisting of nine dances fashioned into an extended "symphonic suite" The arrangement utilizes the full resources of the modern wind band featuring various sections (or consorts of instruments) in alteration with powerful tuttti passages. While the wind parts remain faithful to the original material, the dances are energized with healthy dose of contemporary percussion effects and a significant part for acoustic guitar. The blend of sounds generates a "new, but familiar" element thus making something very modern out of music that is over 450 years old.

Concerto for Piano (Marimba) and Wind Edward Gregson Desmond Chan, Maribma

The Concerto for Piano and Wind is subtitled Homages and is a tribute to various 20th Century composers whose piano concertos inspired Gregson when he was young, particularly Stravinsky, Bartok, Rachmaninoff and Poulenc. The intention was a concerto accessible both to performers and audiences.

There are three movements: fast – slow – fast. The first, *Toccata*, contrasts two main ideas: an impetuous opening theme on the piano (heard after a brief introduction) which is rhythmic in a neo-classical manner, followed by a second theme, more lyrically tinged, heard initially on the flute with the piano taking a subsidiary, accompanying part – the roles are reversed later in the movement. The development section takes on the mood of the rhythmic music with the piano taking off into an extended cadenza at the climax. The orchestra returns with the first theme, with the piano wistfully repeating the second. A brief coda ends the movement abruptly.

The *Passacaglia* built on a rising three-note figure always present in the texture of the music. A simple melodic phrase unfolds, first on oboe, later on piano and soprano saxophone. The movement gathers to its climax (with the saxophone prominent) and subsides again to where it began. The last movement, *Rondo-Burlesque*, has a swirling, dance-like main theme built round a new theme, St. Nicholas, Godes druth, (an example of 12th Century English monody) which, after a brief reference to the opening theme of

the *Toccata*, and the final statement of the Rondo tune, flowers into a triumphant statement to bring the concerto a rousing conclusion. The Concerto is dedicated to, and was written for, John McCabe.

Dusk, Steven Bryant

Dusk is a simple, chorale-like work captures the reflective calm of dusk, paradoxically illuminated by the fiery hues of sunset. I'm always struck by the dual nature of this experience, as if witnessing an event of epic proportions silently occurring in slow motion. *Dusk* is intended as a short, passionate evocation of this moment of dramatic stillness.

Minstrels of The Kells, Dan Welcher

Minstrels of the Kells was commissioned by the Big Twelve Band Directors Association and a supporting consortium of university band programs. The work received its premiere on April 21, 2002 with the Texas Tech University Wind Ensemble.

The piece is in two movements of contrasting musical style and aesthetic. The first movement, "Airs in the Mist", showcases three lovely, lesser-known Irish melodies together. The second movement, "Reelin and Jiggin" is completely the reverse of the first movement in that it is highly spirited. Unlike the airs of the first movement, there are no stores to be told, rather good of dance tunes. Complete with the "sharply edged" sounds of tin whistles.
